

THE CASE OF MUNICIPIO SQUARE AND METRO STATION IN NAPLES

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Originally planned as an infrastructural project, the Municipio project in Naples combines the redesign of a central square with an intermodal metro station. Designed by Álvaro Siza and Eduardo Souto de Moura, the project has evolved into a complex urban transformation, blending archaeological discoveries, transnational expertise, and multi-level governance. As a key example of urban renewal in a heritage-rich context, the Municipio project offers insights into how infrastructure and cultural heritage are negotiated and reshaped through large-scale projects involving both international and local actors.
